# **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

This course is an overview of computer information systems. It introduces computer hardware, software, procedures, systems, and human resources. As a student in this course, you will learn the most important topics of Microsoft Office 2016. No prior computer experience is assumed. First you will become familiar with essential computing concepts and the Windows 10 operating system. Then, you will learn file management, the basics of browsers and e-mail, and overview Microsoft Office 2016. The first application unit covers Microsoft Word 2016, followed by a unit on Microsoft Excel 2016. Next, you will learn to create, build, and maintain a Microsoft Access 2016 database. The last application you will cover is Microsoft PowerPoint 2016, where you will create, apply and modify a presentation.

# COURSE GOALS AND OBJECTIVES:

- Learn basic concepts related to microcomputer operation.
- To achieve working knowledge and skills in operation of a microcomputer.
- Obtain hands-on experience with microcomputers and survey major microcomputer software used to solve business problems.
- Demonstrate skills in solving business problems using four types of software tools.
