Course Description: Survey of the essential subject areas, major theories and approaches to the scientific study of behavior and mental processes.

Course Purpose/Rationale/Goal: To acquaint students with the diverse field of psychology including major theoretical concepts. In addition, introduce methods of research used and how it contributes to the body of knowledge in psychology, promotion of critical thinking, generation of new ideas, and consideration of alternate explanations when evaluating information.

Course Requirements: To maximize the potential to complete this course, a student should attend all class meetings and/or login to internet courses at least twice weekly. In addition, satisfactorily complete all homework assignments and examinations in a timely manner, and satisfactorily complete all other projects or papers as assigned in the course specific instructions.

- 5. Describe accepted approaches and standards in psychological assessment and evaluation.

Classroom Policies

- **Respect for Fellow Students:** All students will maintain respect for fellow classmates' personal beliefs, values, morals and life situations. Insensitivity concerning race, religion, sex/gender, sexual orientation, mental/physical disability, psychological disorders, age, or socio-economic status (family situation) will not be tolerated.
- Electronic Devices: The use of cell phones is not permitted in the classroom; they should be silenced and put away while in the classroom. You will need to sit on the front row if you are using such a devise so that I can assist in holding you accountable to participating in class. If you do not act responsible with an electronic device, I have the right to confiscate it until the end of class, and prohibit you from bringing it in the future. You may use a tape recorder to record lectures.
- Tardiness: Please do your best to manage your time well and be on time to class. If you are tardy, please enter the back of the room quietly and take a seat as close to the door as you can get. Being late to class is disruptive to your fellow classmates. If I have already taken attendance, you will need to speak to me after class to make sure you were not counted as absent.

- **Disruptive Behavior:** "Failure to comply with lawful directions of a classroom teacher relative to maintaining good order is considered misconduct on the part of the student. Repeated violations of disrupting a class will result in the student being dropped from the course." (See Student Guide) □
- Attendance and Administrative Drop Policy: Attendance will be taken during each class meeting. Students will be responsible for material presented and discussed in class. Due to South Plains College attendance policies, any student who fails to attend 5 classes during the semester or fails to complete two major grades may be dropped from the course with an 'X' or 'F.' The last day to drop is 11/16/2017. Absences are excused *only* after I have seen some form of documentation, and that documentation must be presented by the beginning of the next class that you attend. Sending me a text saying I'm going to miss class for XYZ reason does not give you an excused absence. I maintain the right to decide whether an absence is marked as "excused" or "unexcused" based on your documentation, the reason for your absence, your communication with me, and fairness to other students. Attendance Reward: If you complete the course with 2 or less absences (excused or unexcused) you will be able to drop your lowest test grade. *
 Excused absences DO count against your Attendance Reward total. Only students who have 2 or less absences of any kind will earn the Attendance Reward

Exams (100 points each): Throughout the semester 4 (four) exams will be given. See Class Schedule for Exam Dates. All electronic devices including SMART WATCHES should be turned off and put out of sight during exams. Failure to comply could result in a zero on the exam

Make-Up Tests- Should you be unable to attend a scheduled exam for any reason, it is imperative that you **notify me before** the scheduled test date. The make-up test will typically take place prior to the time of the scheduled exam for the rest of the class. In case of an unforeseen major emergency and you are forced to miss a scheduled exam without prior notification, this will count as your dropped grade if you have earned your Attendance Reward. Please know that I only grant Make-Up exams in extreme cases. Here are the stipulations I required: 1. you must

contact me by e-mail within 1 (one) day of the exam, 2. You must provide **documentation** of the major emergency. I reserve the right to deny a make-up exam to maintain fairness to other students. If I choose to allow a make-up exam based on the provided documentation of a major emergency, it must be taken prior to the next class period. **Without documentation** of a major emergency, you will not have the opportunity to make-up the exam. Your make-up exam may not be the same exam administered to the rest of the class. If you simply show up to the next class period after missing an exam without making considerable efforts to contact me by email with in one day of the missed exam, you will most certainly be denied a make-up exam regardless of your circumstances.

Quizzes, Exercises, & Classroom Participation: Participation in classroom discussion, exercises, assignments and quizzes are expected. These assignments give you an opportunity to make certain you are absorbing the material. The quizzes or exercises typically are open book, open note quizzes. Reading the chapter and participating in class prior to the quiz will help you move through them more efficiently. Log on to BlackBoard if you miss a class or text instructor to see if there was an assignment given in class. Coming to class is vital to your success.

Technical difficulties may occur, so manage your time and be prepared to avoid missing the due date.

Project: This Project is designed to display your critical thinking skills regarding the practical applications of psychology. Sometimes students demonstrate their understanding of psychological principles better in projects than in traditional multiple choice exams. I will grade the project on how well you use the information from the lectures and textbook, therefore, the text book should be your primary reference. You are required to submit a hard copy of your project. If it is late it will have 10% deducted per day that it is late. Include a title page to all projects with your name, PSYC 2301 and section number. Be sure to save a digital or hard copy of any project just in case an issue arrives. This project will be averaged with your multiple choice test scores. Academic English and Academic Integrity: Your written assignments should be presented using Standard Written English and be proficient in Academic English... "A form of English that is typically used in academic, professional, and business contexts." An important reminder, as stated in SPC's catalog, "Offering the work of another as one's own, without proper acknowledgement, is plagiarism..." A student who is found guilty of plagiarism could fail or receive a zero on the project for the first offense and could be dropped from the course should a second offense occur.
