GENERAL COURSE INFORMATION

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course provides an advanced presentation of anatomy and physiology of the cardiovascular and pulmonary system.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students will:

Describe and explain advanced concepts of cardiopulmonary anatomy and physiology; Describe the neurological control of breathing, ventilation/perfusion concepts, and summarize principles of gas transport.

COURSE OBJECTIVES - Outline form (correlated to Scans and Foundations Skills)

- 1. The student will gain an understanding of the physiology of ventilation, including lung compliance, airway resistance, and time constants, and their associated calculations. (F-1, F-2, F-3, F-4, F-5, F-10, F-11, F-12, F-16, F-17, C-5, C-7, C-8)
- 2. The student will gain an understanding of the physiology of the pulmonary and systemic vascular systems, and the determinants of cardiac output. (F-1, F-2, F-5, F-10, F-11, F-12, F-16, F-17, C-5, C-7, C-8)
- 3. The student will gain an understanding of hemodynamic measurements, including the calculation of normally computed values. (F-1, F-2, F-3, F-4, F-5, F-10, F-11, F-12, F-16, F-17, C-5, C-7, C-8)
- 4. The student will gain an understanding of the various methods by which oxygen is carried in the blood, factors responsible for shifts in the oxyhemoglobin curve, and the calculations involved in oxygen transport studies. (F-1, F-2, F-3, F-4, F-5, F-10, F-11, F-12, F-16, F-17, C-5, C-7, C-8)
- 5. The student will gain an understanding of the various methods by which carbon dioxide is carried in the blood, and its effects on acid-base balance. (F-1, F-2, F-5, F-10, F-11, F-12, F-16, F-17, C-5, C-7, C-8)
- 6. The student will gain an understanding of the ventilation-perfusion ratio and the effects

- respiratory disorders have on it. (F-1, F-2, F-5)
- 7. The student will gain an understanding of the neuronal control of ventilation. (F-1, F-2, F-5)
- 8. The student will gain understanding of arterial blood gas interpretation and calculations (F-1, F-2, F-5, F-10, F-11, F-12, F-16, F-17, C-5, C-7, C-8)

EVALUATION METHODS

- 1. Five objective unit examinations will be given, followed by a comprehensive final examination.
- 2. Students must complete the workbook assignments as outlined in the course syllabus prior to the unit exam. A grade of 0% will be entered for each workbook assignment not completed. Late workbook assignments will not be accepted. Workbook assignments corresponding to assigned reading and unit are due on test day.
- 3. An ABG interpretation assignment (TBA)
- 3. Make-up exams will not be given. Students will be allowed to drop their lowest unit exam grade

ACADEMIC INTEGRITY

ATTENDANCE POLICY

Students are expected to attend all classes in order to be successful in a course. The student may be administratively withdrawn from the course when absences become excessive as defined in the course syllabus.

When an unavoidable reason for class absence arises, such as illness, an official trip authorized by the college or an official activity, the instructor may permit the student to make up work missed. It is the student's responsibility to complete work missed within a reasonable period of time as determined by the instructor. A student who does not meet the attendance requirements of a class as stated in the course syllabus and does not officially withdraw from that course by the official census date of the semester, may be administratively withdrawn from that course and receive a grade of "X" or "F" as determined by the instructor. Instructors are responsible for clearly stating their administrative drop policy in the course syllabus, and it is the student's responsibility to be aware of that policy.

It is the student's responsibility to verify administrative drops for excessive absences through MySPC using his or her student online account. If it is determined that a student is awarded financial aid for a class or classes in which the student never attended or participated, the financial aid award will be adjusted in accordance with the classes in which the student did attend/participate and the student will owe any balance resulting from the adjustment.

Regular attendance is necessary to successfully meet the course objectives. The student is responsible for all class work covered during absences from class. Students are expected to be in class, on time. A student is tardy if he/she arrives more than 5 minutes after class begins. If a student is tardy to class three times, it will be counted as one absence. It is the student's responsibility to inform the instructor of the reason for an absence and to do so in a timely fashion. A student may be administratively withdrawn from the course if he/she has more than <u>five</u> absences from class and the instructor determines the student is unable to successfully meet the course objectives.

Students who are tardy are asked to respect their peers and enter the classroom quietly in order not to disrupt the class. Students who are late to a class starting with an examination will not be given additional time to complete the exam. The exam will be finished when the last on-time student has completed.

REMEDIATION

REMEDIATION/TUTORING: Throughout the program, students will be assessed in the following domains: cognitive (exams), psychomotor, (lab competency check-offs): and clinic competencies, as a means to establish proficiency in designated areas.

The following information provides the student with avenues for remediation in cognitive, psychomotor, and clinical competencies.

Exam Remediation: If a student fails an exam that is accounted for in the grading system (non- dropped exams), the student will be required to make an appointment with the Respiratory Care faculty within one week of the exam in order to develop a written plan to gain better understanding of the material covered on the exam. This plan will designate responsibilities of all involved parties and may include but not limited to: review of exam topics, written discussion of topics, and oral discussion of topics.
