Grading of Course work:

For the purposes of the Honors section, the student will complete the course work assigned through their seated section and will meet with the instructor periodically to fulfil the Honors portion.

Discussions outside of class:

Students meet 4 times during the semester to discuss their readings in *Major Problems*. Some topics to consider: What is each historian's thesis? Which historians' arguments are most convincing? Be sure to use examples from their essays in order to make your points. What conclusion can you draw from their viewpoints on the topic?

Historiography: Students will write a 7 - 10-page historiographical essay on one of the topics covered in *Major Problems* or a topic of the student's choice. Students will choose their topics by the end of week 8. The rough draft of the essay is due at the end of week 13. The final draft of the historiographical essay is due in class by the end of week 15.

Final Presentation

Each student will present the findings of their historiographic essay in class during finals week. The presentation should be 5-7 minutes. Students are encouraged to use the media platform of their choice (PowerPoint, Prezi, Google Slides, Pecha Kucha, etc).
