Course Description: A survey of the social, political, economic, cultural, and intellectual history of the United States from the Civil War/Reconstruction era to the present. United States History II examines industrialization, immigration, world wars, the Great Depression, Cold War and post-Cold War eras. Themes that may be addressed in United States History II include: American culture, religion, civil and human rights, technological change, economic change, immigration and migration, urbanization and suburbanization, the expansion of the federal government, and the study of U.S. foreign policy.

Course Objectives:

- 1. **critical thinking:** demonstrate creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation, and synthesis of information.
- 2. **communication:** demonstrate effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral and visual communication.
- 3. **social responsibility:** demonstrate intercultural competence, knowledge of civic responsibility, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities.
- 4. **personal responsibility:** demonstrate the ability to connect choices, actions, and consequences to ethical decision-making.

Course Purpose: To acquaint students with the diversity of American history and to promote critical thinking in interrelating the past to the present. Fundamentally, the course promotes general understanding of a body of knowledge any student should know.

Course Requirements: To maximize a student's potential to complete this course, they should attend all class meetings, complete all homework assignments and examinations in a timely manner, and complete all other projects or papers as assigned in the instructor's specific

instructions.

Learning Outcomes: Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

- Create an argument through the use of historical evidence.
- Analyze and interpret primary and secondary sources.
- Analyze the effects of historical, social, political, economic, cultural, and global forces on this period of United States history.

Essay on *Warriors Don't Cry* (10% of your grade)

Warriors Don't Cry is a book by Melba Beals. The book is about the desegregation of Little Rock High School and was written by one of the people who became known as the Little Rock Nine. You will write a formal essay over Warriors Don't Cry. The essay will be written over several weeks' time and the final draft is due during Week 13.

Exams (80% of your grade)

There will be 4 Exam essays approximately four weeks apart. Each exam will cover materials for those weeks. For example, the first exam will cover weeks 1-4 and the final exam will cover week 13-15. This will include assigned readings, discussion questions, and videos. The essays are not timed and can be completed in advance, however, there will be no essays accepted after the due date. These essays will connect specific information from the readings with the broader themes of the course. All essays for this class are formal, persuasive essays.

They should conform to MLA format. We will talk about this one day in class. Please review the rubric and the sample paper posted in Course Documents. **Do not use outside sources**; the assigned readings will be all that you need to complete the essays.

Weekly Discussions (10% of your grade)

You should come to class each Wednesday, prepared to discuss the readings assigned in your weekly folder in Blackboard. I will call on students to answer a question from the readings in a random order prepared before our class begins. Students can, of course, volunteer to answer the questions posed, but everyone will get an opportunity to participate.
