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Course Description: This course is a survey of fundamental principles of political science, including the American system of government and the origins and development of the constitutions of the United States. This course satisfies the Legislative requirement for teacher certification.

Credit: 3 lecture hours

Prerequisites: TSI compliance in reading

Course Purpose: Government 2305, as taught at South Plains College, is a reading intensive course designed to acquaint learners with the origin and development of the U.S. Constitution, structure and powers of the national government including the legislative, executive, and judicial branches, federalism, political participation, the national election process, public policy, civil liberties and civil rights. This course meets the statutory requirements as set forth by the State of Texas. Approval Number 45.1002.51.25

Exams: There will be three exams in this course. Each exam will be worth 20% of your total grade. Each exam will be composed primarily of multiple-choice questions, but there will likely be true/false questions and fill-in-the-blank questions. You will be informed if short answer or essay questions are used in the exam. If I use short answer or essay questions then that portion of the exam will compose no more than 50 percent of the exam's grade.

Quizzes: You will complete 11 quizzes throughout the semester. Each quiz will cover the content found within the folder where the quiz is located. Make sure that you read and/or watch all materials provided in the folder before beginning your quiz. Each quiz will be worth 2 percentage points each. Each quiz will be composed of 5 to 20 questions. The questions in the quiz will be multiple-choice, fill-in-the-blank, and, or, True/False questions.

Discussion Posts: You will complete 4 discussion post assignments throughout this semester. Each discussion post assignment will cover a topic addressed within the weekly folder where the discussion post is located. To complete the discussion post assignment you will need to post a discussion addressing the question I post to you and the class. You will need to respond to that question in roughly 300 to 400 words (a word count function exists on the bottom left corner of Microsoft Word). However, you should write more than 400 words if you need to. It is always better to write more and fully answer the question than to write too little and leave important details out of your discussion.

You will also need to respond to at least 2 discussion posts by other students. You may respond twice to the same student or respond once to two different students. To make a response post

hit the "Reply" button at the bottom of their discussion post. Each response post should be roughly 150 words, but once again write more if you need to.

Introduction Activities: You will complete two introduction activities in Week 1 that will be graded. The Syllabus Quiz will cover the syllabus and ensure you understand the syllabus and the expectations of this course. The Introduction Discussion will be a short discussion post assignment that will allow you to practice using the discussion board feature and allow us all to get to know one another in the online setting.

Assignment: There will be one written assignment worth 10% of your total grade. This assignment will be a response paper to a subject provided by the instructor. More details will be provided by the instructor in Blackboard.

Plagiarism and Cheating: Plagiarism and cheating in any form will not be tolerated in this course. Assignments, quizzes, and exams completed after their due date will only be eligible for half credit if they are completed within 7 days of their due date. A student may receive full credit for their assignments, quizzes, or exams if they have a reasonable excuse for not completing their coursework on time. A reasonable excuse will be determined at the discretion of the instructor. Late work will not be accepted once Week 15 has begun.

Extra Credit: I do not intend to provide any extra credit opportunities in this course. If I provide extra credit it will be announced and made available to the entire class.

Attendance Policy: Since this is an online course I will not take daily attendance. However, you are expected to complete your work on time in accordance with the course calendar. Please email me if you are sick or have another valid reason for failure to complete your assignments.

Classroom Discussions: Given the nature of this course students may express political views contrary to your own and while no one is required to agree with another's political views you are required to be respectful. I encourage you to honestly express your views in this class, when it is appropriate and relevant, but you must be respectful in both your tone and delivery.
